Share the Gift of Home Food Safety This Season

Enjoying food with family and friends is one of the highlights of the holiday season. Foodborne illness can cause severe and even life-threatening illnesses. Easy-to-do, safe food handling practices help protect everyone in the family from getting sick.

- ✓ Defrost carefully. Defrost food only in the refrigerator, in the microwave or in cool water.
- ✓ Wash hands before, during and after food preparation. Wash hands with soap in clean, warm running water for at least 20 seconds.
- ✓ Keep kitchen surfaces clean. Use hot, soapy water to wash countertops and surfaces, cutting boards, refrigerator door handles and utensils.
- ✓ Don't cross-contaminate. Use two cutting boards. Dedicate one for raw meat, poultry and fish and the other for ready-to-eat foods, such as fruits and vegetables.
- ✓ Employ different utensils for different tasks. Use separate spoons and forks to taste, stir and serve food.
- ✓ Buy and use a food thermometer. It is the only reliable way to determine the doneness of your food.
- ✓ Cook all raw beef, pork, lamb and veal steaks, chops, and roasts to a minimum internal temperature of 145 degrees before removing it from heat source.
- ✓ Cook raw ground beef, pork, lamb, and veal to an internal temperature of 160 degrees.
- ✓ Cook all poultry to an internal temperature of 165 degrees.
- ✓ Discard any food left out at room temperature for more than 2 hours (1 hour if the temperature was above 90 degrees).
- ✓ Place food into shallow containers and immediately put in the refrigerator or freezer for rapid cooling.
- ✓ Use most cooked leftovers within 3 to 4 days. Reheat leftovers to 165 degrees.
